#### **FIVE BRUSH FIRES IN 3 DAYS**

Tuesday morning had people in the Verdugo Crestline area checking their fire equipment and their water hoses as a large loom-up rose from the canyon. First responders on scene called in for air support because of the rugged terrain. 45 minutes later, it was out and fire crews were mopping up hot-spots. It was just another day and another fire.

A slow-moving brushfire near the Wentworth/Cottonwood intersection was contained and quenched by a multi-agency taskforce Sunday Morning. The taskforce comprised fire crews from L. A. County, Stations 74, 24 and 98, backed up by water-dropping helicopters.

More than two acres in total were consumed and the ignition point marked for forensic investigation. Later that night, another fire was set on Big Tujunga Canyon Road near the Little League field.

Firefighters from Station 74 responded and put

out the fire in 15 minutes. Less than a ½ acre was consumed. Approximately eight hours later, yet another fire was reported on Little Tujunga Canyon Road.

Sources within the Fire Department were close lipped about the rash of fires. When asked, "Is there an arsonist running around Sunland-Tujunga?" the answer was, "There is nothing I can say, but if you see three fires within 72 hours, you can come your own conclusion."

↑alifornia is home to many beautiful things: miles of spectacular coastline, amazing weather and a culturally rich environment. Danger also lurks within the beauty. From wild-fires and floods, to mudslides and earth quakes, California is home to a darker side that everyone needs to be mindful of as well. Truth is, it's just a matter of time before one of these many homegrown calamities affects you. How will you get in touch with loved ones across town or throughout the region when there is no power, no phone service, little if any cell coverage and no internet? Amateur Radio Operators (or Hams) are poised to help pick up the pieces in the aftermath of a major disaster. Hams have the capacity and the skill to provide some of those initial vital links to family and friends outside the affected area. When disaster strikes

who will you call? You may want to contact a Ham radio operator or, better yet, even become one yourself. Interested in learning more about what Amateur Radio Operators can do?

The Crescenta Valley Radio Club will be participating in National Field Day activities on June 22 & 23rd in Verdugo Park (across from Glendale City College). On Field Day, amateur radio operators take their equipment and expertise "to the field" to make as many contacts as possible across the US and Canada over a 24 hour period. ### Victory Lights Up the Sky for the Fourth of July!

Plags, reworks and Patriots parade to fe and drum on the Fourth of July, to celebrate our national birthday in the uniting of our Colonies into states, who proclaimed their independence as a free nation from the British Crown by drawing up a document called the Declaration of Independence, back in 1776.

For the past year, the American Colonies had engaged in an undeclared war with British rule. Minutemen sprang into action ready to ght to counter the increasing number of Redcoats stationed throughout the Colonies. John Adams, our second President, claimed, "The basis for the American Revolution began in the 1760's with a radical change in the principles, opinions and sentiments of the people," which led them into con ict with their mother country. Throughout the 1600's, large tracts or swaths of land were given by the King, wealthy

England wanted a return on her investment, but

was haphazard in providing governance because of distance. Besides, pressing issues at home with a succession of Kings and constant spats abroad cost money. So, they were content to send merchant ships to the Colonies which they saw only as nancial support. They limited Colony export of cotton, furs and timber to themselves for resale to other countries for pro t. And they demanded that the Colonists import clothes, jewelry, furniture and coaches only from them. At rst the Colonists saw themselves as English subjects and emulated their culture.

English individuals or Charters like a corporation to form Colonies.

But as each Colony grew, the need for governance caused Governors and representatives to be placed, knowing that the English King's word or Parliamentary law superceded their own. After all, they were under the protection of the British Army, and there were multiple threats. Like the Indians, who were alarmed as settlements pushed West. Other countries had also claimed land, like the Spanish in Florida, the Dutch

they had no representation. "Taxes," they complained to the King, "would take their liberty!" But he ignored their plea. Instead, he dispatched more soldiers abroad and billed for the cost of their lodging and service. `An incident occured in April 1770 when Colonists in protest pelted the streets of Boston with oyster shells and rocks. Redcoats fired into the crowd, killing five and wounding more. Known as the "Boston Massacre," John Adams later said, "On that night the

in New York, and the French in Canada with forts extending through the Americas all the way down the Mississippi.

Foundation's of American Independence were laid." The Colonists retaliated by refusing to purchase British goods, which led to the Boston Tea Party and the dumping of three ships of tea overboard.

But when the English engaged in the French-Indian War of the 1760's, they pushed France out of Canada and the Americas to gain the Ohio Valley, and the Spanish and Dutch interest ebbed as well. England now controlled North America and gained global dominance as well. Meanwhile, in the struggle to bear the cost of ghting the French-Indian War, King George III lost power to Parliament, who, wanting


cared.

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#### **Sherri's Turn**



Missing dads. Multiple half and step siblings. Prison waiting rooms. Homeless shelters. Small motel rooms rented by the week. Sleeping in a garage. Sleeping in a car. Missing parents. Drugs. Alcohol. Financial problems. Suicide. Abuse.

These are the facts of life for too many. And when it's kids who are forced to deal with these challenges through no fault of their own it's especially tragic. Adults who find themselves in these situations are often there because of their own poor choices and lack of self control. But the kids. They did nothing. They were just born into a lifestyle of dysfunction.

It's hard to say exactly when the idea came to us. But sometime in the 1990's would be a safe guess. We were raising our kids in an off road environment with regular desert trips and a love of motorcycles. Friends and neighborhood kids were always welcome on our desert outings.

It was the late 1990's when we named our dream:

Thundering Trails. It would be an off road adventure for kids from disadvantaged backgrounds. Still living in the city at the time we didn't know when or where we would do it. But we knew. One day Thundering Trails would become a reality.

In August of 2004 we had the awesome privilege of acquiring the desert land that would become the home of Thundering Trails and on October 24, 2005, our 31st wedding anniversary, Thundering Trails was officially declared a non-profit corporation by the State of California. Thirteen months later we held our first camp.

Meeting with an inner city ministry the administrator told us he had hundreds of kids who would love to attend. We told him we could accept about 8 boys for the first camp.

Four showed up and we were devastated at the small turnout. But 36 hours later when they went home we were exhausted and felt like they had been here 36 days. We never could have handled 8-10 kids in the beginning. It was a huge learning curve and we were to discover that an off road desert adventure with four kids who have never been out of the city and are not your own kids familiar with riding and camping -- and family rules -- was a whole new ballgame. Theft and vandalism and disrespect in the early days helped us to fine-tune our requirements

for kids to attend camp. The goal is not to rehabilitate troublemakers, it's to provide an awesome desert adventure for good kids who come from difficult situations.

Along with a group of dedicated volunteers we have hosted 61 weekend adventures for groups of 8-12 kids since the fall of 2006. We rent a van and provide transportation from the city and the fun starts the minute the kids arrive. Playing tag and hide-n-go-seek are camp favorites shortly after they get off the van until dinner is served. Later it's a hayride and campfire. Saturday is packed full of fun from the moment they wake up with morning hikes to "Big Eyes" the giant binoculars sitting atop a hill, to firing off rockets, a delicious breakfast and then walking the track and suiting up for riding. While one group rides another group chooses between hiking, crafts, games, horseshoes or just hanging out watching the other kids ride.

The day also includes a giant treasure hunt and depending on the weather water gun fights and snocones. Brownies, cookies and milk are plentiful and we've gone through thousands of popsicles over the years, the kids are welcome to as many as they want.


Saturday night brings a delicious dinner followed by chapel service and s'mores around the campfire. More tag and hide-n-go-seek and they're ready to pass out. Sunday morning's incentive to get the bunkhouse cleaned up, bags packed and loaded in the van and sponsor thank-you letters written is one more motorcycle ride before the van leaves for the city at 11 a.m. They take home a 19"x13" camp poster packed with photos and a goodie bag filled with off road stickers and other treats.


And what do we get for the thousands upon thousands of hours the guyin-the-garage and I have invested in this adventure over the years?

Seeing the smiles, hearing the laughter, listening to the excited voices of all the kids talking at once as they exuberantly relate their adventures on the motorcycle track. Time and time again. Camp after camp.

It's a wonderful exhaustion and there is no better return on an investment than knowing we've sent hundreds of kids home filled to the brim with marvelous memories they'll carry in their hearts for a lifetime.


Field Day is Amateur (ham) Radio's open house. Every June, more than 40,000 hams throughout North

#### **ASK RUSTY**

#### **STILL IN THE HOLE!**

**Dear Rusty:** I receive Social Security, but I still go in the hole to the tune of about \$300 per month! I hear some people describing Social Security as "welfare" but I resent that description. Between my employer and me, we pay over 15% of every paycheck to Social Security, so it's not "welfare", it's my hard earned money that I've paid these taxes on for 47 years. The Government has spent my money instead of investing it to make sure I could retire and not live under a bridge. I think that they should pay

me back plus interest so I can live out my retirement! Signed: Disgusted

Dear Disgusted: You're right that it's your hard earned money that you've contributed to Social Security for many years, and it's certainly not "welfare" by any definition. I do understand your frustration but I'd like to clarify a couple of things you are concerned about.

You're correct that you and your employer have contributed over 15% of every paycheck to "FICA", but not all of that goes to the Social Security Trust Fund. The breakdown is that 12.4% goes to the SS Trust Fund, and the rest - 2.9% goes to help fund Medicare. The combined 12.4% Social Security contribution is evenly split - 6.2% each by you and your employer. Of the 6.2% you both contribute, 5.3% goes to the Old Age & Survivors Insurance (OASI) fund from which regular Social Security benefits are paid, and 0.9% goes to the Disability Insurance

(DI) fund from which SS disability benefits are paid. Nevertheless it is, as you say, your money - and your

employer's that goes into these funds.

Social Securi-

ty really wasn't

individual retire-

set up as an

ment investment vehicle; rather it was designed so that current workers contribute to a fund from which "old age and survivor's" benefits are paid to eligible seniors. Said another way, those working now pay for those now retired. Any excess - contributions over and above that spent to pay benefits - is deemed to be "surplus". By law, the money in the Trust Fund can't be used for anything other than Social Security & Disability benefits, and (also by law) any surplus money from contributions must be invested in "interest-bearing securities backed by the full

faith and credit of the Unit-

ed States". This is done via

special- issue government bonds, which pay interest at "market rate" (currently



1.5%). As of the end of 2015, the Social Security Trust Fund had about 2 3/4 trillion dollars invested in those special-issue bonds, which are redeemable either at maturity or on demand as needed to pay benefits.

The Trust Fund's revenues still exceed costs every year, although the amount of annual surplus is declining because the ratio of workers to retirees is declining. Current estimates are that Social Security's "old age & survivor insurance" revenue will stop running a surplus about 2020, after which any income shortfall would be taken from the Trust Fund's

investments. The trust fund wouldn't run out until about 2034, at which point bene ts will be reduced unless Congress acts before

then to improve solvency. AMAC has developed a "Social Security Guarantee" which we have been regularly promoting to Congressional Representatives in Washington, D.C. This is a common-sense plan which ensures that Social Security will be able to pay full bene ts into the next century, and we plan to continue lobbying congress to adopt the AMAC plan, or something similar.

So, to recap, the money you contributed while you were working

went to pay bene ts for those already retired and, after you retire, contributions from those still working will be used to pay your bene ts. And any surplus funds collected were invested in interest-bearing bonds for future use, and those funds cannot be used for any other purpose than Social Security bene ts payments.

#### **Chamber of Commerce Officers Sued!**

wo of the chief officers **■** of the S-T chamber have been sued in small claims court for refusing to pay their debts. Chamber president and cartel candidate Hrant Vartzbedian who did not win a place on the 2019 Sunland Tujunga Neighborhood Council ordered a half page and two quarter page ads for placement in the Foothills Paper. Although the aggregate full page ads were in good quality placed on a color page, Vartzbedian and his cartel members lost by a landslide as the will of the people. He then declared that The Foothills Paper made the ads look bad to make the cartel team look bad, and that he demanded a written apology on the front page of The

Foothills Paper. Unfortunately, just because you lose an election does not forego paying ones bills.

Julie Ward, co-owner of Sunland Printing and first vice president of the chamber is being sued for failure to pay for damages done to a customer's vehicle that Ward denied happening. "And the world turns."

When the Tautlian cartel collapsed, it took the S-T Chamber of Commerce with it. Even though they had their election last November, they have not had enough members to pay the rent or keep their doors open. In fact, ever since cartel leader Sonia Tatulian spent all their funds, conducted a fraudulent "Food Truck Nite," and destroyed

all the chamber files and memorabilia, the chamber has been slowly in decline. With the 2019 STNC election finished, this might now be the time to re-vitalize the chamber with new projects and members. The chamber in the past had been a major sponsor of the 4th of July fireworks but because of mismanagement, they have lost many supporters. But the existing officers say that cartel head Sonia Tatulian, is no longer involved with the chamber, so any new funds that they obtain are fairly secure. What is known, is that the chamber did not file their papers with Spectrum Spectacular for purchase of their fireworks package.
