Super Tanker Helicopters to help fight California Wildfires!

Southern California fire agencies are getting two large-scale helicopters that can each carry up to 3,000 gallons of water or retardant to try to limit the spread of wildfires just as hot dry weather is setting in.

Los Angeles, Orange and Ventura counties fire agencies, which are home to a combined 14 million people, said they are entering a partnership starting last Tuesday that will help deploy critical air resources quickly to wildfires, including the two large-scale Boeing Chinook helitankers known as CH-47s, a helitanker that can carry up to 1,000 gallons, a coordinating helicopter and a mobile retardant base.

The tri-county effort, dubbed the quick reaction force program, will be in place for up to six months and funded with up to \$18 million from the Southern California Edison company. It comes as much of the region is bracing for an early season heat wave and red flag warnings signaling the potential for wildfires.

“The fact that we’re bringing these copters is a plus, a significant plus,” Los Angeles County Fire Chief Daryl Osby told reporters at a demonstration of the helicopters at the Joint Forces Training Base in Los

Alamitos, California.

The agencies said the CH-47s will be able to drop fire retardant through the night, something they haven’t been able to do before, and that could significantly help firefighters limit the spread of these blazes.

Fire officials throughout the region are concerned by the tinder-dry weather conditions and a decline in the number of hand crews who work on the ground to contain wildfires. Osby, for one, said he has 10 hand crews ready for the upcoming fire season compared with 28 of these crews about five years ago.

The use of these large-scale helicopters is also an advantage Osby said, that until now his agency has been counting on helicopters capable of carrying only 350 gallons or 1,000 gallons of water at a time.

Orange County had the use of a CH-47 last year. It was equipped to drop water overnight, but not retardant, which is used around the edges of a fire to try to limit its spread, Orange County Fire Chief Brian Fennessy said. He said he was looking forward to having this capability at night when winds tend to die down and temperatures fall. ■

Californians will be able to sue those responsible for illegal assault weapons and ghost guns

At Santa Monica College last week, the site of a mass shooting that claimed the lives of six people including the gunman in 2013, Governor Gavin Newsom signed the nation’s first legislation allowing individuals to sue those spreading illegal guns as California continues to ramp up its gun safety protections. The 2013 shooting involved an unserialized AR-15 type semi-automatic rifle built by the shooter using legally purchased components, a ghost gun that would be subject to lawsuit once SB 1327 is law.

“For the sake of our children, this is a common-sense step toward ensuring California streets, schools and communities continue to be among the safest in the nation,” Hertzberg said after the governor signed SB 1327 into law. “If Texas is going to use this legal framework to essentially outlaw abortion and harm women, all with the Supreme Court’s blessing, California is going to use it to save lives and take AR15s off our streets.”

Practicing safe protest: Just Say No to violence

“Get the f__k out of here!” screamed the young woman.

I understood. She was enraged, yelling at a small group of evangelicals with their powerful loudspeaker, at the end of the Pride parade last month.

While such parades are


becoming more common across the US, the Pride parade is such a signature Portland, Oregon event, one of joy, color, lots of children, hundreds of parading organizations in their own forms of celebration of just being alive, being accepted as full human beings, expressing themselves with smiles, cheers, and nods of appreciation to each other and to thousands of Portlanders lining the parade route on the sidewalks.

But of course, as we know, the lives of countless gay, lesbian, transgender, bisexual, and uniquely identified people have been both physically and psychologically traumatized by dominating, aggressive people who cannot seem to attain a level of maturity that accepts all. Rising above the hurt to enjoy a day in the sun, a day of utter acceptance by thousands, a day to proclaim their authentic selves, harming no one, supporting each other--that is a day that can offer profound comfort and an emotional "battery recharge" that can last a while.

I'm a member of the Portland Peace Team. We are unarmed. We have a code of nonpartisan nonviolence. When organizers of events invite us to come help with public safety, we ask if the code of conduct they are advertising for their event is unarmed nonviolence. We ask if they will announce from the stage or with their megaphone that they have invited us to help keep conflict from escalating.

If they say yes, we are happy to help, small as we may be. We've been doing this for a decade in the streets of Portland. We've helped at Pride several years, we've gone to some BLM events, we've helped a few times with the children's climate strikes, with the Women's March, refugee and immigrant rallies, and much more.

Our goals: 1) keep everyone safe, 2) help deescalate

conflicts. We have no special authority, just the moral authority given to us by those who have worked hard to organize an event.

When conflict escalates and there is no code of nonviolence, Portlanders know what happens. Many orga-

nizations and many activists are righteously enraged by injustice, and yet without nonviolent discipline, and especially with aggressive rage, their campaigns often alienate the public, actually reversing their intended goal of generating mass support for the policies they want put into effect.

The protest atmosphere in the US in general and in Portland in particular is rougher than it was even a

few years ago. Downtown Portland and other areas of town have seen personal violence and property destruction that has no rational justification (I say this as someone who does understand when it may be justified and explicable).

Pride this year was a bit tougher than in the past. Tempers are shorter. Violence is closer to the surface. All 10 of us from the Portland Peace Team who were on hand that day focused on trying to deescalate the hot conflict at the extremely offensive evangelical loudspeaking, where happy Pride people were being told they were going to hell, etc.

It got physical a few times. Eventually the loudspeaker

equipment was damaged and the evangelicals left. Now they have new trauma that may affect their behavior in the future.

By far the most effective of those who confronted the rude loudspeakers were some young people holding a colorful blanket up in front of the speakers and singing and dancing. Their joy was under their control, not extinguished by the objectionable interrupting loudspeakers. We attempted to convince the few who were enraged to dial it down, with mixed success.

After, one of our members said, "I am positive it would have been far worse if we weren't here today."

Our peace team is one of many across the US and we hope more and more folks seek training in more and more towns so we can return to protest that is very assertive, but not aggressive, not alienating to the public, and everyone stays safe. ■

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It's absolutely crazy weather we're having, but then again, everything is absolutely crazy here all the time. What's next, a plague of locusts?



Congressman Schiff on House Passage of Right to Contraception Act

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Congressman Adam Schiff (D-Burbank) issued the following statement after the House voted to pass the Right to Contraception Act:

“For years, right-wing activists and politicians have united behind a singular goal: to stack the Supreme Court with reactionaries who will prioritize a backward partisan agenda over all else. That plan bore fruit last month when the Court struck down *Roe v. Wade*, robbing millions of their fundamental right to reproductive freedom. But the Court's decision to overturn *Roe* may just be the beginning. As Justice Clarence Thomas indicated in his opinion in *Dobbs v. Jackson*, the Court is likely to reexamine other key precedents, such as *Griswold v. Connecticut* which guarantees the right to contraceptives.

“Today, House Democrats took bold, preemptive action to protect that right for all Americans. Deciding whether to have children is one of the most significant decisions anyone can make – and it's a decision the government ought to have no part in. We cannot allow this Court to further erode what's left of reproductive freedom in this country. The Senate must act.”

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

How to Build an Emergency Go-Bag

This guide walks you through the basic items so you can build a kit yourself—mostly with items you’ll find around your home. At the end there are further resources to dive into your planning efforts.

Water: One gallon, per person, per day for three days.

Keep in air-tight, plastic containers that are easy to access.

Food: Three-day supply of non-perishable foods.

Camping Cooks has a great emergency food guide for Eating and Cooking When the Power Goes Out. Don’t forget food for your pets.

First Aid: In an emergency, you or a family member may be injured. An adequate First Aid kit can keep a minor injury from turning major. You may want to take a basic first aid class through the Red Cross or online through the National Safety Council.

Basic First Aid Items in Your Kit:


- Sterile gloves.
- Sterile dressings.
- Soap and antibiotic towelettes.
- Antibiotic ointment.
- Adhesive bandages in a variety of sizes.
- Eye wash solution.
- Thermometer.
- Prescription medications you take every day.
- Prescribed medical supplies such as glucose and blood pressure monitoring equipment and supplies.

First Aid book: Non-prescription drugs (aspirin or non-aspirin pain reliever, anti-diarrhea medication, antacid, laxative).

Sanitation: Adequate sanitation is a significant environmental concern after a disaster. When sewer pipes are damaged or the sanitation system goes off-line, entire communities, including people and habitats are at risk. Be prepared to take care of your waste for the same period of time as you’ve prepared food and water. A basic sanitation kit should include:

- Toilet paper.
- Soap.
- Feminine supplies.
- Plastic garbage bags & ties.
- Plastic bucket with tight lid.
- Chlorine bleach.
- Supplies for pet waste.

Tools & Supplies: What you need can vary greatly based on



where you live, the type of disaster you expect and your family unit. Talk with your family about items they wouldn’t want to be without in an emergency. Here are some basic items that most people will need in a disaster:

- Wrench to turn off gas and water lines
- Cups, plates and utensils (raid your camping gear to save money -- just don’t forget to replace them after each trip).
- Light source (solar is best so you don’t have to worry about batteries).
- Radio (get one that is USB powered and check out our Solar Charger & Battery Bank or buy a battery-operated radio and extra batteries).
- Manual can opener or a utility knife.
- Small fire extinguisher.
- Pliers.
- Duct tape.
- Matches in a waterproof container.
- Plastic storage container to keep everything in one place.

Documents: In preparation, scan valuable documents and store them securely online so they can’t be ruined by a disaster. It may be helpful to have copies of key items (like insurance cards, social security number, passwords and insurance policies) in your kit as well. Take short videos to catalogue valuables in your home, such as vehicles, computers, furniture and artwork, for insurance purposes. Key documents include:

- Will, insurance policies, contracts, deeds.
- Passports, social security cards, immunization records.
- Bank account numbers.
- Credit card account numbers and companies.
- Family records (birth, marriage, death certificates). ■

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

I'm 78 and Still Working; Should I Apply for Social Security?



Dear Rusty: I am 78, still working, have a good healthcare plan and I make a nice salary. Can I still get my Social Security check since I paid into it all these years?
Signed: Still Working in My 70s
Dear Still Working: You not only can get your Social Security check now, I recommend you apply for it as soon as possible. Regardless of your current earnings, you'll not suffer any penalty because you are still working. That's because you stopped being subject to Social Security's "earnings test" when you reached your full retirement age (FRA) of 66 some years ago. Indeed, your Social Security benefit continued to grow until you reached 70 years of age, at which point it reached your maximum benefit, which is 32% more than your benefit would have been at age 66. Since your benefit reached maximum some years ago at age 70, and since working now won't hurt your payment amount, you should claim your benefits immediately. You should also ask for six months of retroactive benefits. Although your benefit stopped growing at age 70 and

you're now 78, Social Security will only pay up to six months of retroactive benefits, thus you have lost some of your benefits by waiting until age 78 to claim. You can apply for your benefits either by calling SS at your local office or the national Social Security service center at 1.800.772.1213 to make an appointment to apply, or you can apply online at www.ssa.gov/retire. Applying online is by far the most efficient method, but you'll need to first create your personal "my Social Security" online account to do so (simply go to www.ssa.gov/myaccount and follow the instructions). Since you're still working, and assuming you have "creditable" healthcare coverage from your employer, you can delay enrolling in Medicare until you stop working ("creditable" coverage is a group plan with at least 20 participants). If you haven't yet enrolled in Medicare and you've had

creditable healthcare coverage since you were 65, you will not incur a late enrollment penalty for enrolling in Medicare now, but you can also continue to defer enrolling in Medicare without penalty if your employer coverage is "creditable." I strongly encourage you to apply for your Social Security benefits as soon as possible, because you will continue to lose money by delaying further. You will still get credit for your current earnings even after you start your Social Security benefits and, if appropriate because of your recent earnings, your benefit amount will be automatically increased, so there is no reason to delay claiming Social Security any longer. You earned your Social Security benefits, you aren't subject to a penalty because you're still working, and you'll continue to get credit for your current earnings while still working, so you should apply for your Social Security benefits as soon as possible.■

SB 1327, authored by Senator Bob Hertzberg (D-San Fernando Valley), allows Californians to sue those making, selling, transporting or distributing illegal assault weapons and ghost guns – guns made at home to avoid tracing – for damages of at least \$10,000 per weapon involved. The same damages are also available against gun dealers who illegally sell firearms to those under 21 years of age. The legislation is modeled after Texas’ wrongheaded anti-abortion bill, SB 8, which places \$10,000 bounties on doctors, providers and others involved in providing life-saving abortion care. “Our message to the criminals spreading illegal weapons in California is simple: you have no safe harbor here in the Golden State. While the Supreme Court rolls back reasonable gun safety measures, California continues adding new ways to protect the lives of our kids. California will use every tool at its disposal to save lives, especially in the face of an increasingly extreme Supreme Court,” said Governor Newsom. “While some politicians put up

roadblocks or say nothing can be done, here in California we are once again proving we can take on the gun lobby and protect our communities,” said Attorney General Rob Bonta. “With these new laws, California is protecting life, safety, and freedom. We have the strongest gun safety laws in the nation, and one of the lowest firearm mortality rates. This is not a coincidence. More guns do not make us safer — laws like these do. Period. I am committed to enforcing our commonsense gun safety laws, and keeping weapons of war off our streets and out of the hands of dangerous individuals.” “The continued need to adopt sensible solutions to our nation’s tragic history of gun violence is dire and necessary,” said Senator Anthony Portantino. “That includes SB 1327 - which I am proud to jointly author with Senator Hertzberg. “Untraceable ghost guns purchased without background checks have fueled gun violence throughout California and the nation and for far too long,” said Shannon Watts, founder of Moms Demand Action and California resident. “Thanks to leadership by gun sense lawmakers and relentless advocacy from our grassroots army, California continues to lead the nation in taking life saving action to combat ghost guns.” ■
