Mylar and Power Lines Don't Mix

Mylar balloon struck a power pole on Haines Canyon last Friday and caused a possible arcing explosion that led to a power outage in Tujunga that affected over 150 residents.

The incident happened shortly after 9:45 p.m. in the Haines Canyon Tujunga Canyon area, DWP workers said.

It was believed the balloon struck a power pole, and live wires began to arc, but no wires went down. The problem was located and fixed within 30 minutes and neighbors who had heard the explosion returned to their homes.

One man said he heard an explosion inside his bedroom

so loud, it scared all of the people in his house. "Like a big light, fire, like a blow-up, boom!," described Armen Kachaqurian. "Everybody came out because they didn't know what it was.

They thought it was a bomb. No injuries were reported as crews worked to fully restore power.

International Combat Camera Association at-the-heels craft was called the "Groot Beer" (big bear), run by the Holland-America line, and it took eight days to cross the Atlantic. The "Groot Beer" had been built as a so-called "Liberty Ship" during World War II, one of 2700 such vessels designed to keep arms, men and goods crossing to Europe in spite of the deadly depredations of German U-Boats.

The average time to construct these 450-foot steel ships was 30 days, and the fastest time was four and a half days! Imagine the urgency, the round-the-clock teamwork of the designers, welders and riveters, tying together the modular sections, slapping on paint, and letting another steel giant slip down the runway into desperately needed service.

This is only one example of the extraordinary mobilization of resources, talent and will that defeated the Axis powers. Is there something about us humans 85 years later that prevents a similar mobilization against our real enemies? We possess vastly faster and more efficient productive capabilities than those that were available to Franklin Roosevelt.

But the reality of our personal and global interdependence has not yet penetrated our minds deeply enough for us to undergo a similar, now worldwide, mobilization.

Fly over any major city at night, and you will see lights burning in hundreds of skyscrapers as if global warming did not exist. Examine the military budgets of the nuclear powers and you will see trillions of dollars pouring into the renewal of nuclear arsenals—weapons for a war no one can win.

Establishment foreign policy journals are full of articles about the Ukraine war and its implications for possible hot conflict with China—themselves also

wars no one can win, except maybe the arms dealers. In the board rooms of the giant fossil-fuel companies and in the halls of Congress, executives and lobbyists rationalize slowing the inevitable transition to renewables on the basis of their obligation to maximize benefits to shareholders. Our chaotic political-media complex masks the dysfunctional juggernaut of economic and military competition with their own competition for ratings.

We humans are an odd species. In spite of all our accomplishments, there seems to be a near-fatal lag between the conditions that threaten us and the actions required for survival.

The future always belongs to the species that can adapt successfully to the conditions that surround them. These conditions now include world-ending weapons and world-stressing heat, floods and storms. Such transnational challenges dictate the nature of the changes we must make. No exceptions for any life form on earth, very much including people, rich or poor.

President Biden showed his understanding that we were in a new world when he said in Vilnius a few weeks ago:

"When others do better, we do better as well—where we understand that the challenges we face today, from the existential threat of climate change to building a global economy where no one gets left behind, are too great for any one nation to solve on their own, and that to achieve our goals and meet the challenges of this age, we have to work together. The world is changing. We have a chance to change the dynamic."



ur community lost a wonderful long time resident in a terrible tragedy on Monday. My neighbor, an 87-year-old veteran and 35year La Crescenta resident passed away under tragic circumstances. My neighbor had been despondent the past few months, facing imminent homelessness. He had been in a loving relationship with his partner, the homeowner, close to 40 years and his partner always told him he could remain in the home until his death, should she pass away first. Sadly, she did recently pass away and these wishes weren't in writing and her family immediately took steps to evict him.

My neighbor repeatedly begged to stay, offering to continue to pay rent as he had been doing for the past 35 years, stating this was his home and he wanted nothing more than to stay in his own home. He pleaded with the partner's family, over and over, that he was 87 years old, in poor health to include cancer, and unable to cope with the idea of having to start over. The family reportedly told him they wanted him out so they could rent the home for \$6500 which was out of reach of his federal pension. My neighbor's family got the help of a lawyer but legally the 60-day eviction was able to move forward. My neighbor was also able to get the help of Board of Supervisor's Kathryn Barger's office who was absolutely amazing.

Multiple agencies immediately mobilized and tried to help him

with this situation, including Glendale PD, Adult Protective Services, the manager of Glendale Homeless Services, Legal Aid, LAHSA, Salvation Army and Mental Health Veteran's Peer Outreach Services. Sadly, my neighbor was so incredibly despondent, hopeless and helpless with his predicament he wasn't able to accept any of this help. He couldn't see beyond his desperate wish to stay in his home and couldn't fathom having to start over and leave his home at his age and physical condition.

Desperate, and within a few days of the pending Sheriff's lockout from the eviction, my neighbor tragically saw no other way out other than to end his life, shooting himself in the head on Monday. He left a suicide note indicating he held the partner's family completely responsible for the action he felt he had to take, as all he wanted so desperately was to live out his remaining years in the only place he knew of as home. To honor my neighbor's life, I have set up a small memorial on the 3300 block of Paraiso Way where people can place flowers and/or candles and sign a memory board with good wishes. Even if you didn't know him, feel free to honor his memory, even if just with flowers from your garden, a kind word on his memory board or a prayer. It would have been his 88th birthday this Saturday, so birthday wishes are welcome as well.

> My neighbor was an amazing person and had lived a wonderful and happy life. He was a proud air force veteran and retired postal worker, and kept our Crescenta Valley community safe for over 20 years, driving the Sheriff's volunteer patrol cars around town and helping direct traffic at community events. He was passionate about philosophy and loved to engage in intellectual discussions. He was an avid gardener and took pride in his rose garden. If you care to tune into the Board of Supervisors meeting, which can be live streamed online, they will be honoring his life at the end of their meeting during their "Adjournments."

The meeting will be this coming Tuesday, 8/8 (not sure the timing since the length of their meetings are unpredictable).

Lastly, I hope none of you ever experience the depths of depression and sadness that led my neighbor to take this tragic action. There is help out there. The National Suicide Hotline is readily available for anyone in need simply by dialing 988. I also urge all of you to make sure your last wishes are in writing by going to a lawyer to set up a trust/will. Please no negative comments as this will only add to the grief and pain for those of us trying to process this tragic loss.■

The eco-philosopher Thomas Berry insisted that the earth cannot be saved in pieces. Anyone who puts solar panels on their roof benefits the planet as a whole. Anyone who builds more coal-fired plants to generate electricity degrades the planet as a whole. My survival and yours depends upon both of us, all of us together, doing what is necessary for the survival of all, including trees, fish, bees, plants, and rivers, whether you are my adversary or my ally.

Military strategists warn generals not to fight the last war—in other words, to adjust their thinking to actual present conditions. But in every war around the world, the reality is we are fighting that last war, and, to an ever-increasing absurd degree, it is completely the wrong war. So how do we start to fight the right war against the right enemy-war against war itself and against global climate catastrophe?




Pogo said something similar: "We have met the enemy and he is us."











Beware the Attack of the Ticks: SomeCan Give You Lyme Disease, Says AMAC

t's the height of summer, a time of year whenwe are most vulnerable toinsectborne diseases. It's athreat that will still be withus well into the Fall. Dr.Robert R. Redfield, directorof the Centers for DiseaseControl [CDC], warns that a growing list of diseasescaused by the bite of aninfected mosquito, tick, orflea have confronted the U.S. in recent years, making a lot of people sick."

Tick attacks can be particularly nasty for seniors, says Dan Weber, president of the Association of Mature American Citizens. "They can cause severaldifferent illnesses, mostnotably Lyme disease. Allof these sicknesses canhave harsh symptoms butthey rarely result in death, although the elderly haveweaker immune systemsand are therefore moresusceptible.

According to the CDCthe symptoms of Lymedisease include fever,rash, facial paralysis andarthritis and can last up tosix months. The InterimHealthcare Web site notesthat these "symptoms canbe harsh but slow to set in a person could be infected with Lyme disease for full month with nothingbut a small rash at the bitelocation before more serious symptoms set in. Laterstage Lyme can includeincreased rashes, partial facial paralysis, arthritis andjoint pain, irregular heartbeat, brain and spinal cordswelling, nerve pain and shortterm memory loss." Not all ticks carry Lymedisease. Weber says, "it isthe blacklegged tick andthe western blackleggedtick that are the culprits. They are not common inall 50 states. In fact, upuntil about 20 years, theywere common only in the Northeastern United States.But two decades later theycan be found in 1,531counties spread across 43states. Rebecca Eisen, aresearch biologist at the CDC, tells us that blacklegged ticks inhabit thenortheastern, midAtlantic, and northcentral regions ofthe United States, and thewestern blacklegged tickare found along the PacificCoast."

Weber says he did someresearch and found thatyou can tell the differencebetween the blackleggedand the common dog tick[which is not known tospread disease] by the physical differences between thetwo. The blacklegged tickis much smaller than thedog tick and the dog tickhas white markings on itsback. The AMAC chief also suggests that you do not panic if you find a tick has attached itself to yourbody; you've got up to 24hours before an infectioncan set in. So you have timeto get help in removingit at an ER, for example."Whatever you do, don'ttry to squeeze it out or usea lit cigarette to coax it out.If you can't get medicalhelp, use tweezers to gripit as close as possible to itsmouth to remove."And, now it is reported that a new species of tick, the "Longhorned Tick" hasrecently been identified in-New York, New Jersey, Virginia, West Virginia, NorthCarolina and Arkansas.According to one report, "while they have beenknown to transmit diseaseto humans in other parts ofthe world, health officialssay more research is neededto determine whether that'spossible in the U.S."

To prevent tick bites, the CDC suggests that you: Treat clothing and gearwith products containing0.5% permethrin. Permethrin can be used totreat boots, clothing andcamping gear and remainprotective through severalwashings. And that you, • Use Environmental-Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insectrepellents containingDEET, picaridin, IR3535,Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus(OLE), paramenthanediol (PMD), or 2-unde-canone. EPA's helpfulsearch tool can help youfind the product that bestsuits your needs. Alwaysfollow product instructions•



Dog Safety Tips

Tith summer almost at an end and back-to-school on the horizon, I know what you're thinking: "Gimme a hotdog - I'll worry about getting into that swimsuit next year". Or maybe that's just me. 
Dear Rusty: I read your article entitled "Doing a Breakdown Analysis" and noted that the article was in response to a reader question about when to take Social Security Benefits. The writer commented "I'm in pretty good health and don't really need the money right now." The breakeven analysis you suggested is a great help in determining whether to claim early or wait to take Social Security benefits; however, and in light of your reader's comment that "he did not need the money right now," perhaps another element should be added to the breakeven analysis. That element is to roll the figures based on taking the money early and investing that money month after month for the 48 months in question. The end result should also help in determining an appropriate course of action. I was in the same position back in the mid 90's and made out far better by taking the money early and in-

vesting it. In any event, it's one more way to look at this issue. Signed: Faithful Reader.


D e a r Faithful: Thanks for your feedback. I certainly agree that there's more than one way to look at the ques tion of when to take Social Security. And, yes, I'm quite familiar with the strategy of taking benefits early and investing them. But since I'm not a Financial Advisor and not qualified to give investment advice, I'm required to restrict my remarks to only the Social Security aspects relating to questions I'm asked. You might be interested to know, however, that many financial advisors today do not recommend taking Social Security benefits early, investing the money, and trying to earn more than the Social Security benefit growth they'll realize by waiting. Unlike the investment opportunities of the 90's, it's pretty hard these days to beat the 6.7% annual growth in one's Social Security benefit realized by waiting until full retirement age (FRA) to collect, as well as the 8% annual growth one realizes by waiting beyond full retirement age.

And those higher benefits are



for life, which is significant when considering that average life expectancy is now well into the 80's and living into the 90's is now relatively common. Another consideration when taking benefits earlier than one's full retirement age is that there is an annual earnings limit which, if exceeded, will result in Social Security withholding benefits, so a person's intentions for continuing to work could have a financial impact and should be included as part of any financial analysis. And yet another is that Social Security benefits are taxable if certain income thresholds are exceeded, so taking benefits early when someone is still earning a large salary will increase their income tax liability. The point is, it's never an easy or clear-cut decision as to when to start Social Security, and many factors such as those mentioned above need to be evaluated. And the breakeven analysis, which compares cumulative benefits at different claimages, should only be one

piece of the puzzle.

El Grito is a free event that happens every year at the steps of City Hall that commemorates the history of the moment when ordinary citizens heeded the call in the fight for Mexican independence from Spanish rule. This time-honored tradition is one that I especially love, because it celebrates our rich cultural history and influence here in our city.

Transfer of Ownership in Rental Properties

In our ongoing efforts to create a fair and equitable housing landscape, it is crucial that we address the growing trend of corporate entities owning rental units across the nation. Recent data reveals that 43 percent of all rental units in the City of Los Angeles are now under corporate ownership. This shift has been fueled by advantageous tax and regulatory policies incentivizing corporations and by a complex bureaucratic maze of rules that are often difficult for "mom-and-pop" landlords to navigate. It is why I introduced a motion that instructs the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) to conduct a study on the concentration of ownership and corporatization trends in the City's housing stock by the end of each calendar year. I am also asking LAHD to recommend actions be taken to help "mom and pop" landlords retain their properties.


Streamlining Employment Authorization for Asylum Seekers

According to Section

208 of the Immigration and Nationality asylum seekers must wait at least six months after submitting their asylum application to receive work authorization in the United States. During this waiting period, asylum seekers stay in shelters or hotels. I introduced a resolution supporting S.2175 (Gillibrand), which would amend Section 208 of the Immigration and Nationality Act to reduce the waiting period for employment authorization for asylum applicants from six months to one month. Providing much-needed assistance to this community is crucial in ensuring asylum seekers can become self-sufficient.

Celebrating 100 Years of Los Angeles City Hall

City Hall will celebrate 100 years in 2028, mere weeks before the world arrives in the City for the Olympics. It is important to recognize this anniversary in a way that honors all the achievements that have happened within the walls of the building and throughout our vast City. This week I introduced a motion requesting Project Restore, who were leaders in the restoration of historic City Hall, to report to the Council on plans to honor the 100th anniversary of City Hall!

Equally bland is Ken (Ryan Gosling), whose only traits are that he enjoys the beach and pines after Barbie. He and the other Kens (Simu Liu, John Cena, and more) and one guy named Allan (Michael Cera) are happy to let the Barbies run things while they live like second-class citizens. In fact, everyone in Barbieland is happy all the time, until one day when Barbie is suddenly unhappy.

She goes to see the wizened Weird Barbie (Kate McKinnon), who sends her on a quest to the real world to find the source of her nagging thoughts of death and cellulite. Ken comes along, and both are shocked by what they find. Barbie discovers that she's not the feminist icon she thought she was, as despite the disparate models and careers, the entire toy line is still considered pretty vapid. Ken learns that most of the world is run by a patriarchy, and that seems to be working out pretty well. Barbie visits Mattel headquarters, where the CEO (Will Ferrell) wants her to return to the status quo, but she's not sure that's what she wants anymore. She escapes with the low-level employee that's been affecting her mind (America Ferrera, who gets an amazing monologue late in the movie) and her cynical daughter (Ariana Greenblatt). Together they all return to Barbieland, where they have to stop the newly-power-hungry Kens and... learn to get more out of life, I guess.

Admittedly, I'm not doing the story much justice, but in fairness, neither does the movie itself. Writer/director Greta Gerwig knows that she wants a number of story beats and ideas explored. But they aren't tied together smoothly. For example, to what degree are the characters supposed to be literal dolls? Sometimes they move like normal humans, other times they're affected by a lack of joints (and a lack of other body parts too, don't think the movie isn't going to address "that"). Why has it taken decades for certain concepts to reach Barbieland, and why now? What effects do Mattel and Barbieland have on each other, exactly? The movie dismisses these qualms in the laziest way possible, with a joke that follows the structure of "Is it A or is it B?" "Yes!" Frankly, I think the entire Mattel portion of the film could have been cut and Gerwig should have come up with another way for Barbie to have an important conversation with creator Ruth Handler (Rhea Perlman).
