WILDFIRE TRAINING **FOR LA VOLUNTEERS**

OS ANGELES — Volunteer brigades will help their neighbors prepare for wildfires and other disasters in an area devastated by the 2018 Woolsey fire as part of a new program approved by the L.A. County Board of Supervisors.

At least 100 volunteers from Santa Monica Mountains communities are expected to start training early next year, learning about wildland fires, radio protocols and the incident command system used during major disasters, said Brent Woodworth, chairman and chief executive of the nonprofit Los Angeles Emergency Preparedness Foundation, which will run the program.

The volunteers will teach their neighbors how to harden their homes, including how to best clear brush and update a home's siding or roof to be less likely to burn. They will also conduct free home ignition assessments that outline to homeowners what parts of their property are most at risk and how to fix the problem.

Although they won't be on the front lines of fighting a fire, the volunteers will help evacuate people and then "mop up" after the fire passes.

Loop Fire Memorial Remembered

TYLMAR, CA. On Friday November 3rd at One o'clock, staff members of The Foothills Paper did a Remembrance of the El Cariso Hotshots "Loop Fire" Memorial dedication at the El Cariso Regional Park, 13100 Hubbard Street in Sylmar, California.

The Loop Fire which began on the Angeles National Forest clamed the lives of twelve firefighters who worked on the El Cariso Hotshot Crew. On November 1, 1966, the El Cariso Hotshots, a U.S. Forest Service Wild-land Firefighting Crew, were trapped by high flames as they worked on a steep hillside in Pacoima Canyon. Ten members of the from severe burn injuries in the following days remembered the new monument.

bringing the total to twelve. Most of the nineteen members who survived were horribly burned and remained hospitalized for a long time.

On November 1, 1996 thirty years after the tragedy, a memorial was placed in the El Cariso Regional Park commemorating the lives that where lost and the lessons learned from the Loop Fire. 5 years ago the monument was severely damaged. In an effort to never forget the lives that were lost, a new duplicate monument was commissioned and and was dedicated in it's in its new location within the park.

To honor those who lost their lives and for those who survived, the Angeles and Cleveland Nationcrew perished that day, and two members died al Forests along with Los Angeles County officials

Can you believe it, Thanksgiving is in 3 weeks, and then Christmas is coming. I hope that there will be some really great events put on by Mc Groarty and




Wouldn't it be nice if we could just stop worrying about who is trying to take over S-T this year and join together to have one big community awareness/action group?


Dear Rusty: Can my wife claim her benefits now (at 63, and we know about the reduction for claiming early) and then, when I retire at 66 years and 10 months of age almost 3 years from now, can she switch over to spousal benefits based on my benefit amount? She worked at a higher paying job for much of her career but is now at a much lower income and would be under the amount that would reduce her benefits further. I currently earn about nine times her annual salary so the spousal benefit for her would be an increase when I retire. Signed: Seeking Informa-

Dear Seeking: Yes, your wife can claim her own (reduced) Social Security retirement benefit now, and she will be automatically awarded a spousal boost when you later claim your SS retirement benefit. However, your wife's benefit when you claim will not be 50% of your full retirement age (FRA) amount because she claimed her own SS benefit early and also because her spousal boost will be awarded prior to her FRA. Any benefit

Can My Wife Claim Her Benefit Now, and Switch to a Spouse **Benefit from Me Later?**


taken before FRA is reduced, including the spousal benefit.

Here's what will happen if your wife claims her own Social Security at age 63:



- When you claim at your full retirement age, your wife will get a "spousal boost" to her own reduced benefit.
- The amount of your wife's spousal boost will be the difference between her FRA entitlement and 50% of your FRA entitlement, reduced because the spousal boost will be awarded (automatically) before she has reached her own full retirement age. FRA amounts are used to compute the spousal boost, regardless of the age at which benefits are claimed.
- When you claim your wife will not yet be her FRA, so the amount of her spousal boost (the difference between her FRA entitlement and half of your FRA entitlement) will be reduced.
- The reduced spousal boost will be added to your wife's reduced SS retirement benefit, resulting in her total benefit payment being less than half of

The only way your wife can



the full 50% of your FRA entitlement is to wait until her own FRA (67) to claim Social Security, but by doing so she also forfeits the money she would otherwise receive if she claimed her own benefit now. As long as she won't significantly exceed the earnings limit while working before her FRA, claiming now is an acceptable strategy because it will take many years to recover the money forfeited by waiting until her FRA to claim. It's also reasonable because women statistically outlive men and your wife's benefit as your surviving spouse will be 100% of the amount you are receiving at your death, instead of the smaller spousal amount she was receiving while you were both living.

When to claim is always a personal choice, and life expectancy should always be thoughtfully considered, but the answer to your specific question is - yes, if your wife claims her own benefit at 63, she will automatically receive her spousal boost when you claim, but her payment as your spouse will be less than 50% of your FRA benefit amount.

"We don't want (anyone) to stay with their garden hose and try to fight the fire," Woodworth said. "We want them prepped and out."

On Tuesday, the Board of Supervisors kicked off the program, which will include Malibu West, Point Dume, Corral Canyon, Big Rock, Topanga Canyon, Hidden Hills and communities along the Ventura-Los Angeles county line, by approving an agreement between the county Fire Department and the foundation.

The Fire Department helped develop the training curriculum and will help with regular training exercises.

"The Community Brigade Program will harness the tenacity of our Santa Monica Mountain communities so that we have specially trained force multipliers doing the work first responders alone cannot do — not just during a disaster, but beforehand, connecting with neighbors to assist with emergency preparedness," Supervisor Lindsey P. Horvath said in a written statement.

The foundation, which is funding the program through private donations, will soon start recruiting for two groups of volunteers who will help not only with wildfires but earthquakes, floods and mudslides. One group must meet physical fitness requirements and will work in the field. The other will help with communications, logistics and education. The volunteers must participate in quarterly training sessions.

As a fire approaches, field volunteers might gather at a safe refuge area and provide updates to neighbors on social media and over handheld radios to fire and sheriff officials, serving as communication liaisons.

The Bible Comes with its own Instruction Manual

Lessems no matter what you purchase these days it comes with an instruction manual, some kind of technical writing explaining how to use the product. In our increasingly litigious society, much of this technical writing is devoted to how NOT to use the product. Technical writing is so common we don't give it a second thought and often discard it. Few of us curl up by the fire with a good instruction manual to read the fine print. It's only when we get in trouble that we might dig them out of the trash to scan the trouble shooting section.

In life, when we get in trouble, many of us turn to the Bible for guidance, help or inspiration. But if we're honest, the Bible it can sometimes be more confusing than comforting. Thankfully, it too comes with its own instruction manual; technical writing explaining how to read and understand its pages. It is the second-to-last section we call "the epistles," a fancy way of saying "the letters from the apostles." Much of this was written by the apostle Paul.

He was the ideal candidate for this task. First, he was a devout Jew, immersed in the Hebrew Scriptures. Second, he was a Roman citizen, which gave him access to the legal system. This enabled him to present the Gospel before governors and kings and ultimately before Caesar himself. In addition to Hebrew, Aramaic and Latin, Paul knew Greek and was well-versed in Greek philosophy. But perhaps Paul's greatest qualification was his most shameful one: that he had persecuted the faith. He hated Christianity and sought to eradicate it, putting innocent men, women and children in prison. But God had mercy on him and knocked him off his high horse on the road to Damascus.

Paul said it this way: "This is a trust-worthy saying: Christ died for sinners, of whom I am the worst." To truly understand the scriptures, we read it through the lens of the apostles' teachings: God is a holy, righteous and impartial judge; but He's also loving, merciful and kind. He alone has provided a way to solve this dilemma, one Way for us come boldly into his presence for help in our time of trouble: faith in his son Jesus.

Volunteers might also help firefighters coming from out of town, guiding them to water resources and the best roadways to reach mountain communities.

"Getting this credentialing is not a get-out-of-jail free card or a free pass to get into critical areas to check on your house," said Woodworth, whose group has helped with major disasters in the region since 2008.

The brigade idea came from research that the foundation did after the Woolsey fire started near Bell Canyon and raged to the ocean, burning almost 97,000 acres and killing three people.

Communication and coordination were major issues during the fire. A 2019 Times investigation found that fire-fighters failed to effectively deploy resources early in the fight, which allowed the blaze to explode when winds picked up late in the evening.

A large number of residents stayed to protect their homes but became overwhelmed by the fire's speed and power and had to call 911, said L.A. County Assistant Fire Chief Drew Smith.


This took firefighters away from the front lines as they rushed into "life-safety mode," said Smith, who oversees the Santa Monica Mountains region of L.A. County.

"That happened over and over and over on the Woolsey fire," Smith said.

No wildfire is the same, Smith said, and it is dangerous for people to think they can always stay and protect their homes, he said.

The community brigades could help change that culture and serve as trusted and trained allies who know which of their neighbors will need help evacuating, he said. Smith said he hopes the L.A. County program can serve as a model for other high-risk fire areas.
