Carnage Continues On La Tuna Canyon Road

Four people were killed in five months in Sunland-Tujunga as the city put the Vision-Zero program into effect. Safe Streets meetings continued with minimal response from the community.

When the fourth fatality happened at the intersection of Marybell and Wentworth, the city went into action. A town hall meeting was called. Traffic engineers along LAPD officers and reps from the mayor's office came to discuss La Tuna Canyon and their upcoming plans for modifying Foothill Blvd. and the bike lane.

One witness to the Wentworth fatality accident on wrote to The Paper saying, "My reaction was essentially anger and frustration. I would have to say that the city is not responsible for any one particular crash or death no matter how bad it may be. This particular incident was not the city's fault. No matter what we try to do, it's still the driver's responsibility to drive safely, even though it's clear that these sections of the road are unsafe."

This latest headon accident on La Tuna Canyon was the result of someone driving at an unsafe speed and hitting two other vehicles headon. Thankfully, there was no fatalities this time. ■

ARMENIANS MARCH ON TURKISH CONSOLE LAST WEEK

Armenian Genocide Remembrance Day was commemorated across Southern California Wednesday as it marked the 109th anniversary of the start of events widely viewed by scholars as the first genocide of the 20th century.

"Genocide denied is genocide repeated," said Edward

Barsoumian of the Armenian National Committee of America-Western Region. "Not only were there 1.5 million Armenians massacred during the Armenian Genocide of 1915, the same genocidal policy continues today with Turkey and Azerbaijan working diligently to eradicate the Armenian people."

On April 24, 1915, Ottoman authorities arrested Armenian in-

tellectuals and community leaders in Constantinople, leading to an estimated 1.5 million people being killed. Turkey denies the deaths constituted genocide, saying the toll has been inflated and that those killed were victims of civil war and unrest.

enjoy participating in this annual event held in different California cities every spring. The Hope of Mayor Garcetti

No wonder Mayor Garcetti got elected! Shouldering 40 years of inaction, he's given new hope to both the homeless and the families of our community. His latest program metamorphoses the public into units of "HOPE TEAMS", standing for Homeless Outreach Partnership Endeavor, Social Service trained units to better allow them to treat humanely the homeless population, and to better deal with their health, mental and addictive problems.

First rolled out in the San Fernando Valley last May and later to the other three police bureaus throughout the city, each of the teams consist of a city sanitation crew, a homeless outreach team from the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority and police officers trained in dealing with the homeless population and city rules for dismantling encampments.

Commander Todd Chamberlain

said the LAPD has been working closely with LAWSA, a joint city and county agency that provides services to the homeless to make sure the HOPE teams are not "based solely on enforcement."

"We're kind of right in the middle" Chamberlain says, "Because some groups think we do too much... aggressively. On the other side, there's community groups, businesses who say we do too little. So, for the enforcement we try to handle this social problem in as effective, constitutional and ethical way."

The city's previous policy for removing encampments and debris from sidewalks was challenged in court, so the city adopted revisions that still allow encampments to be taken down but provide more notification to the homeless, prevent city officials from throwing away certain personal belongings or medicine and allow the homeless to keep up to a 60 gallon bin's worth of belongings with them, as long

as the items are personally attended.

HEALTHY STREETS, attached, are the new guidelines governing our streets. So, please, let's all work together to keep streets healthy and safe. You may call the HOPE team by dialing 311 or 911 for removal of encampment. Bear in mind this is to schedule an appointment at a given location - this is not emergency service. HOPE work hours are 9 to 5 Monday to Friday. Remember, warmer weather fewer beds. Winter shelter closing eliminated 1,259 beds from the county system, forcing hundreds back on the street. So far this year, the San Fernando Valley HOPE team joined the LA Bureau of Sanitation on 54 cleanups and placed 4 people into shelters. Contacting 144 people who were homeless, 82 refused services.

But we can be thankful and tranquil and proud

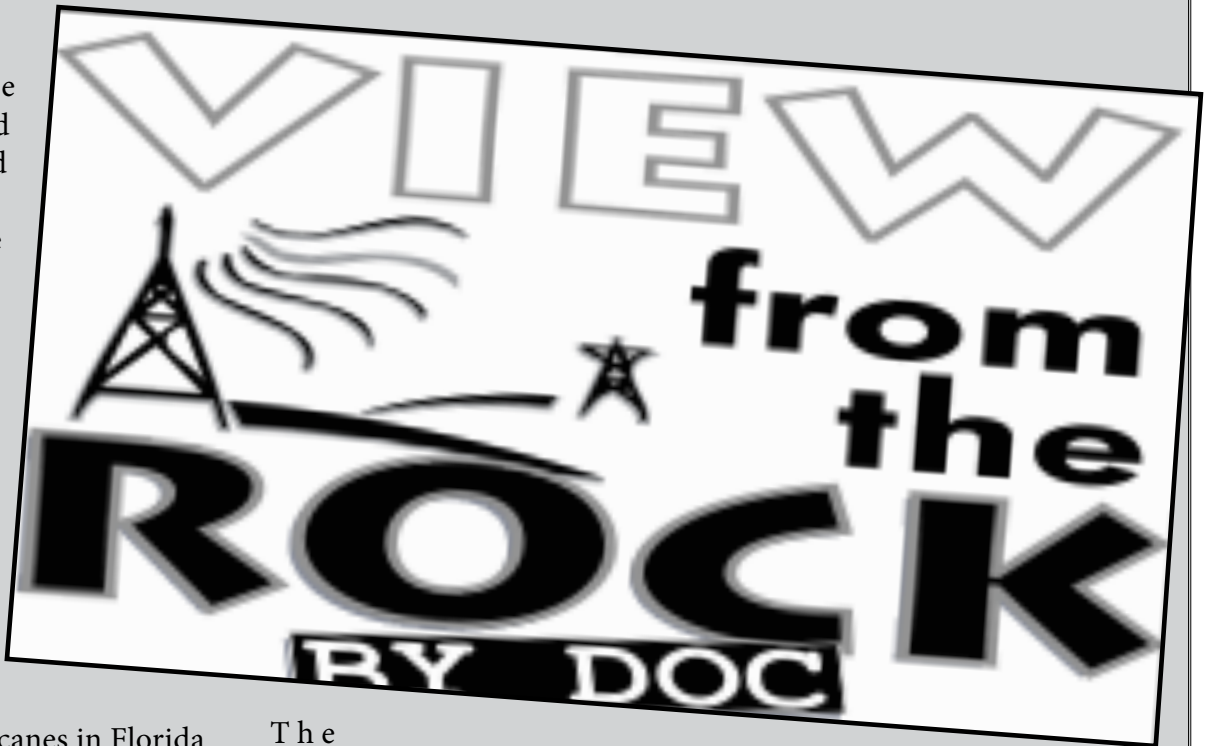
Cause we've been endowed by a mushroom shaped cloud

Holy Woof Batpeople, nothing has changed in 50-some years. It sort of makes you wonder if anything is real and if doing anything has any lasting effect. The difference between then and now, is that we have a greater amount of law enforcement on site. From our little demonstration with the ANTIFA and Anti-Trumpers a few years ago, over a 100 cops were on the streets of Tujunga. Foothill Blvd. And no one got killed. For the moment, there are no apparent outsiders directing these demonstrations that the media calls riots. But then again, the media wants viewers, demonstrators don't accomplish anything - RIOTERS do.

So, after the bombs really begin to fall in the Middle East, and we're up to our asses in war victims, all you can say, is that it's The Water. ■

LA, GLENDALE SCHOOLS CLOSED

Schools were closed today in the Los Angeles and Glendale unified school districts to commemorate Armenian Genocide Remembrance Day.

The LAUSD Board of Education adopted a policy in 2020 to close schools on Armenian Genocide Remembrance Day. Students and teachers in the Glendale Unified School District have been given the day off on April 24 since the 2013-14 school year.

A bill establishing Genocide Remembrance Day as a state holiday to be observed on April 24 and permitting public schools and community colleges to close in observance of the holiday was signed into law by Gov. Gavin Newsom in 2022. ■

Data showed 30 suffered from mental illness and 54 were experiencing substance abuse. Up here in Sunland-Tujunga the HOPE team has provided invaluable help to both our lead officers and our outreach advocates by providing a safe 'no arrest zone' particularly when working with couples and waiting for transitional beds to vacate, motel vouchers to arrive, or Section VIII housing negotiations to complete.

In a nod to homeowners, our streets have been mapped and color coded to delineate streets that can be acceptably parked on by homeless living in cars or campers, both during the day and at night. Not within 500 feet of parks or schools. And not most residential streets. Flyers are Posted at North Valley City Hall, 7747 Foothill, the Councilman's Office is to the left.

But if you are homeless and want housing, come Tuesday morning at 9 a.m. sharp (to 12 p.m.) to the end of the right hall and sign up with Eric Montoya, outreach director for LA Family

Housing. Have a CA ID, proof of Income plus a phone. There's a point system so only use county hospitals like Olive View, Hillview or Tarzana.

Interview to get on the CES computer. A new "jail inreach" program was instituted in January to help connect inmates who will be out shortly and homeless, to needed services. The department is also beginning a pilot program that supplies officers with Narcan, a substance that is used to reverse drug overdoses.

Garcetti claims to have the solution, "but it's not a sprint— it's a long distance race!" ■

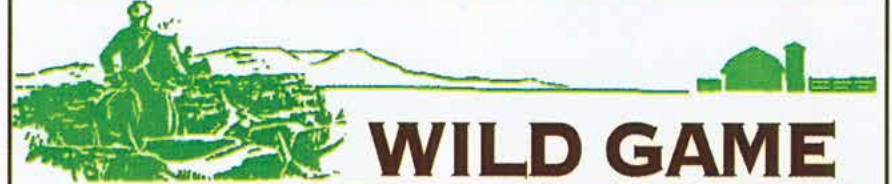

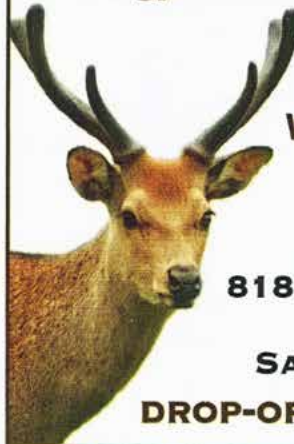

Soliloquy

A Site-Specific Immersive Dance Experience



With three indoor/outdoor performances on May 31 and June 1 at 8 p.m., and June 2 at 7 p.m., attendees choose their own adventures, immerse themselves in the performance, follow performers while affecting the experience by being able to make choices including selecting the music, shaping the narrative, and choosing who dances the final solo.

Be part of the story as dancers perform in the historic mansions and beautiful private grounds of this iconic landmark.

Soliloquy shares individual stories of what it feels like to be shuttered away and disconnected from touch, laughter, and sharing. It also investigates the flattening of human connection to social media and screens. Soliloquy asks how is the curated self in constant negotiation with reality? How does isolating behind a screen deepen our loneliness while simulating connection? This piece relies on the participation of the audience, and one of the goals is to enliven conversation and connection between the strangers who attend.

Audiences are integrated into the story, with some sitting for dinner with a quarreling family, selecting the music that plays, or even becoming the focus of the work. Meeting at the intersection of technology, disruption, inclusion, and diaspora, each performance is an exciting and unique

adventure, shared in a singular experience by those in attendance. At points during the performance, participants may gather to break bread, toast, and engage in discourse with fellow guests.

Soliloquy is composed of various contemporary solos housed in living rooms, bedrooms, dining areas, and even a chapel – a true glimpse into secrets and private lives of the characters, told through dance, with 18 professional Blue13 dancers. The pandemic forced us into loneliness. The sole human connections were through interactions on flat screens. Soliloquy critiques the reification of social media and Zoom as the standard for human interaction, by physically inviting audiences into the homes and lives of strangers. Blue13 seeks to interrogate the ways in which this technological connection, coupled with isolation, have specifically impacted people of the Global Majority.

Soliloquy takes place on Friday, May 31 at 8 p.m.; Saturday, June 1 at 8 p.m.; and Sunday, June 2 at 7 p.m.

Widower's Retirement Stymied by Social Security's "WEP" and "GPO" Rules

Dear Rusty: My wife passed away 4 years ago. I want to retire so called SSA and was told I can collect my own SS at 62, reduced by WEP. My wife's SS was greater than mine, but they said I do not qualify for hers at age 60 because of the GPO. This seems odd that I get zero for her, however I can collect mine at the two thirds reduction at 62. Is this true? This zero dollar amount places my retirement on hold for now. I was counting on her SS. **Signed: Discouraged Widower**

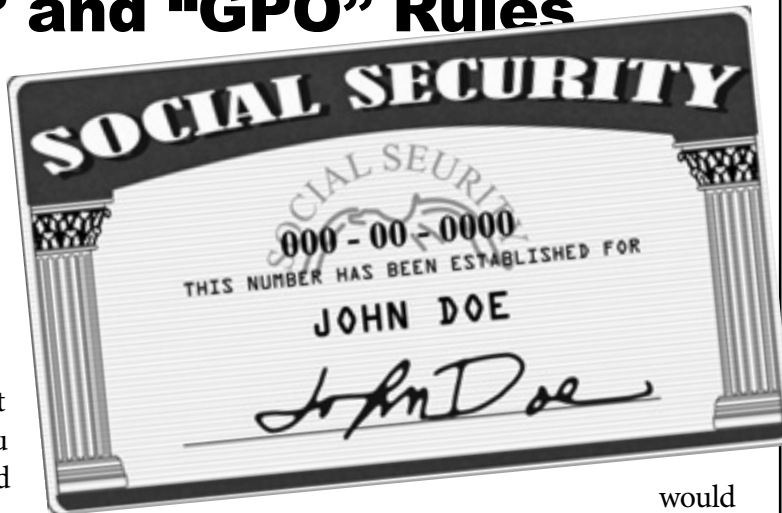
Dear Discouraged: The Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and the Government Pension Offset (GPO) are two of the most confusing (and unpopular) of Social Security's myriad rules. From the way you describe your conversation with the Social Security Administration, it doesn't appear to have concluded with you fully understanding how these provisions work, so allow me to elaborate.

WEP and GPO affect anyone who has a retirement pension from a federal, state, or local government agency which did not participate in Social Security, meaning neither the employee nor the employer paid into Social Security based on the employ-

ee's earnings. Obviously, you have such a pension, which means that WEP will reduce any Social Security retirement benefit you have earned from other employment where payroll taxes were withheld, and the GPO will affect any survivor benefit you are entitled to.

WEP affects only the SS retirement benefit you earned elsewhere; WEP does not affect any surviving spouse benefit you might be entitled to from your wife. Rather, it is the GPO which affects your survivor benefit, again because of your state retirement (called a "non-covered pension" - one earned without contributing to Social Security). The GPO will reduce any surviving spouse benefit you might be entitled to by 2/3rds of the amount of your "non-covered" state pension. Depending on the size of your state pension, that reduction may entirely eliminate your surviving spouse benefit from your wife.

Under normal SS rules, a surviving spouse does not become eligible for survivor benefits until they reach age 60 (age 50 if disabled). Normally, a surviving spouse benefit claimed at age 60 is reduced by 28.5% and it is the GPO (not WEP) that will affect your survivor benefit whenever you claim it. However, even without GPO, your age 60 survivor benefit amount



would be only 71.5% of the amount your wife was receiving (or entitled to receive) at her death. If you are already collecting your non-covered state pension when you claim your SS survivor benefit from your wife, then that reduced age 60 survivor benefit would be offset by 2/3rds of the amount of your state pension. And that (according to what Social Security told you) is what eliminated your age 60 eligibility for a surviving spouse benefit from your wife. If you don't claim it at 60 your survivor benefit will continue to grow until you reach your full retirement age (FRA) of 67, but if 2/3rds of your state pension is more than 100% of your SS survivor benefit, you still won't get any surviving spouse benefit from your wife's record. A further consequence of your non-covered state pension is that the SS retirement benefit you earned elsewhere will be reduced by WEP. WEP will reduce, but cannot eliminate, your Social Security retirement benefit. The WEP formula is complex but, generally, your WEP-based Social Security retirement benefit will likely be roughly half of what you would get if you did not have a state "non-covered pension."

"Let me repeat that: As soon as we can use catastrophe modeling and incorporate the net cost of reinsurance into our rates, we will be open to business in nearly every part of California."

The company will offer coverage "in nearly every corner" of California, Zimmerman said. The testimony marks the first time a large property insurer has publicly promised a return to the market in the disaster-prone state if the new regulations are implemented.

More than half of the major property insurers in California have cut back on business in the state in recent years in response to the increasing severity of wildfires, as well as state regulations that limit the cost of policies.

Allstate confirmed in a statement to Bloomberg News that it seeks to increase its market share in California, but rates must "fully reflect the cost of providing insurance to consumers" before agreeing to lift its current restrictions. The new rules will allow for rate increases that the company says will ensure they can pay customers' claims in the event of a fire, according to the statement.

Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara says the proposed reforms, which would not need legislative approval or to be signed by the governor, represent the biggest changes to the state's insurance market since 1988. Specifics have been scant and the overhaul is still in draft form, but Lara expects the process to be complete by the end of the year.
